## CHAIR AND VICE CHAIR REPORT AUGUST 2021

From the snowmen in our last magazine, we are now basking in a heatwave. We hope that everyone is enjoying the sunshine and easing of restrictions safely.

As most residents are now aware the consultation phase for the proposed North Lincolnshire Green Energy Park (NLGEP) ended on 25<sup>th</sup> July. The Parish Council are concerned that a number of local residents appear to have either not received the consultation pack, or not realised the significance of it, and have therefore not completed the response form. We have passed on our concerns about the packs not being fairly distributed amongst the local community most affected by the proposed incinerator. We would also urge residents to be on the lookout for further information in the future, and to make sure **everything** is read. Please read any documents or brochures carefully, as the actual proposal at this stage is only for an incinerator. The extra peripheral 'green' proposals will come much later, if at all. We are in the process of setting up a Working Group to fight the proposed incinerator and if anyone would like to be involved, please contact the Parish Clerk on [clerk@buspc.org](mailto:clerk@buspc.org).

You will notice the new Grange Wind Farm funded benches on Flixborough Road/Barnston Way and the Paddock are now in place. The memorial plaques will be re-installed as soon as possible.

The long-awaited resurfacing of Todds Lane has now been completed, funded by North Lincolnshire Council Community Grant Fund, for which we are all extremely grateful. The new surface is a safe and vast improvement on the old one and has made life much easier particularly for those with mobility issues.

The new footpath from Burton to Thealby is now complete and is already being well used. It is lovely to see the self-seeded poppies growing alongside the path. This footpath was funded by North Lincolnshire

Council and is a huge asset to the area connecting two villages together.

We hope you all enjoy the rest of your summer.

## **ON THIS DAY IN HISTORY**

Welcome to our section where we look back in time to see what our Parish Council of yesteryear were doing. This issue brings us the minutes of the Parish Council Meeting held on 6<sup>th</sup> June 1966. These minutes were handwritten into the minute book during the meeting – no mean feat! These are the last handwritten minutes in the book.

### **BURTON ON STATHER PARISH COUNCIL**

Minutes of the Meeting held in the County School  
on Monday 6<sup>th</sup> June 1966

G. W. ROBINSON Esq. Presiding

Apologies were received from Councillors H E Dain and J Ellis  
The Minutes of the Meeting held on Monday 2<sup>nd</sup> May were passed as being a true record of business then transacted on the proposition of Councillor Kitchinson, seconded by Councillor Sutton.

### **MATTERS ARISING OUT OF MINUTES**

#### **LONG HEDGE FOOTPATH.**

It is apparent that neither the R.D.C. or Messrs. Carton & Ames are now interested in the part closure and diversion of Public Footpath No.

164. It was resolved therefore that in view of the proposal having had the approval of this Council, and also the Annual Parish Meeting, some twelve months ago, the Clerk to the Lindsey County Council be given the full facts of this matter, and be requested to set in motion the necessary formalities for the closure and diversion.

#### SIGNPOSTING OF PUBLIC FOOTPATHS.

Enquiry to be made of the Clerk to the Lindsey County Council as to whether or not any progress has been made for the signposting of Public Footpaths in the Parish.

#### FLOODING AT THE STATHER.

Councillor Sutton stated that the water stood to some depth in the dyke, on the Hills, cut by Trent River Authority, this was apparently due to a back fall. Councillors Robinson and Sutton agreed to make an inspection.

#### HILL TOP DYKE.

Jas. Martin & Co. to be asked for their comments following the reminder to them that the Parish Council were to be made an annual allowance of £6 in respect of maintenance of the dyke along the Hill Top.

#### VILLAGE GREEN.

The County Surveyor has submitted a plan showing his proposal for improving the South end of the High Street; under this scheme the small triangle of ground known as the Village Green will virtually disappear. Approval was given to the scheme by the Council, and it was resolved that the Surveyor be asked to put in hand the improvement at the earliest possible moment instead of in next year's programme as he has suggested.

#### GREEN LANES.

It was resolved that the Right of Way No. 167 from the Stather up the Hills, and the continuation of it from off Tee Lane to Coleby, No. 22 be registered as Green Lanes.

### DEMOLITION OF OLD C OF E SCHOOL.

A meeting has been arranged between representatives of the Council and the Vicar and Wardens on this matter for 16<sup>th</sup> June. The Council representatives will be Councillors Kitchinson and Smith. The R.D.C. Treasurer Mr A.D. McNaughton has also promised to attend.

### REORGANISATION OF SECONDARY EDUCATION.

A Public Meeting is called for 21<sup>st</sup> June in connection with the proposed reorganisation of Secondary Education.

### AID TO YOUTH CLUB.

In reply to the enquiry as to whether or not the Council could help the Youth Club financially, the Lindsey Association of Parish Councils suggest the matter should first be referred to the Area Youth Officer, and if for any reason the County Youth Service cannot help, the Lindsey Association of Parish Councils would then ask for advice of the National Association of Parish Councils.

### ANY OTHER BUSINESS

### PUBLIC FOOTPATH TO FLIXBOROUGH.

This matter will be on the Agenda for the July meeting of the Council.

### LITTLE FIELD FOOTPATH.

The clerk was instructed to remind the County Surveyor of the Council's request of 9<sup>th</sup> March for the Public Footpath No. 172 from Flixborough Road to Burton High Street to be resurfaced with slag grit.

### GULLEY COVER IN FLIXBOROUGH ROAD.

The Divisional Highways Surveyor to be informed that the pre-cast concrete cover over the gully in the grass verge on Flixborough Road, on the corner adjacent to Wood Hill, is broken.

## **BROADBAND IN THE PARISH**

Recently, the Parish Council helped several residents in Burton upon Stather get fibre optic broadband to their properties and after being approached by a resident of Normanby it is now in the process of getting improved broadband in this village as well.

Openreach has confirmed that it can install fibre optic broadband into Normanby and has given a provisional offer. Although they have given a proposed cost of £705 per household this can be reduced and may be free if enough residents subscribe to a voucher scheme. This means that when asked, residents can sign up to the scheme and offer their voucher to Openreach. Each voucher is worth £1,500 for a residential property or £3,000 for a business and is put towards the cost of the installation. If only half of the properties in the village signed up to the scheme, then it would be free. The only other stipulation is that residents sign up to a gigabit-capable connection with their chosen supplier for twelve months.



If residents of Normanby are interested in signing up to the scheme, can they please contact the Parish Clerk on [clerk@buspc.org](mailto:clerk@buspc.org) for further information.

The Parish Council is also aware that the broadband in Thealby is not that good as well, but a separate application would need to be made. If residents of Thealby are interested in getting fibre optic broadband, then can they also contact the Parish Clerk.

# "Your Parish Council Needs YOU"

Have you ever wondered what the Parish Council does in the community? Then why not get in touch and even consider becoming a Parish Councillor.

Burton upon Stather Parish Council is the local level of government for Thealby, Normanby and Burton and currently has three Councillor vacancies.

Council usually meets on the third Tuesday of each month, which are public meetings open to all residents of the parish. It is non-political and councillors give their time voluntarily.

The Council:

- Discusses and resolves issues raised by parishioners and represents their interests to North Lincolnshire Council, the Government, and other bodies.
- Raises an amount of money, the Parish Precept, through local taxation and makes decisions about its use specifically on parish amenities and groups.
- Plans, and prepares for the developing needs of the Parish.
- Is a statutory consultee of the local Planning Authority, North Lincolnshire Council, for all planning applications made within the Parish.

If you are over 18 years of age and are on the electoral roll for the parish or have lived or worked in the Parish for at least 12 months, then you could be eligible to become a Councillor. If this interests you, then why don't you attend a Council meeting to see what goes on or get in touch with the Clerk or a Councillor to find out more. There are Councillor surgeries held fortnightly on a Monday in the office where you could discuss with a Councillor.
