Well, we asked and you gave! And gave and gave and gave. The response to our plea for donations to help the Afghan refugees was absolutely phenomenal. The Wedgwood Room and the stage area in the Hall were completely full. It has taken many hours to sort through all the donations, separating out toiletries and warm blankets to go North Lincolnshire Sanctuary Group based in Gainsborough and the rest (a lorry-load) to go to Yorkshire Aid. Both these organisations do a lot of work with refugees and will be able to distribute items to help set up homes as needed. We are extremely grateful to each and every one of you who donated, and feel extremely proud of how our Parish responded to such an awful crisis.

We held a public meeting on 5th October to discuss the proposed North Lincolnshire Green Energy Park (NLGEP). The overwhelming response from the public was that the Parish Council should continue to oppose the NLGEP. A working group comprising of members of the affected parishes has been set up and we will keep you all updated.

North Lincolnshire Council have published their updated Local Plan for consultation. It would appear that the proposed development off Darby Road is no longer a consideration. The Parish Council will continue to monitor this issue, and keep you informed. If you want to look at the Local Plan it can be found at www.localplan.northlincs.gov.uk/stages/4. We hope that you all stay safe and well and enjoy the Christmas season.

ON THIS DAY IN HISTORY

Welcome to our section where we look back in time to see what our Parish Council of yesteryear was doing. This issue brings us the minutes of the Parish Council Meeting held on 7th December 1964.

BURTON ON STATHER PARISH COUNCIL

Minutes of the meeting held in the County School on Monday 7th December 1964

G W Robinson Presiding

<u>APOLOGIES</u> were received from Messrs. R N Coulthurst, E Markham and E H Dain

PLAYING FIELDS

In connection with this matter, approval was given by the Council to a letter which the Chairman proposed should be sent to the Scunthorpe Corporation expressing his appreciation of the Council and Parishioners of the work which the Corporation were doing to make Normanby Park into Public Park, and of the facilities for recreation which would be available there, and enquiring if they would raise any objection to these facilities being made available to the Parishioners. The letter also suggested that if the Corporation considered that a meeting on this matter would serve any useful purpose, the Council would be only too please to meet them.

CHURCHYARD EXTENSION

The Chairman stated that the Vicar had informed him that he considered that the available space in the existing Churchyard, offsetting the increase in population, would suffice for about eleven years.

HILL TOP HEDGE

Councillor Smith told the Council that R Readhead had now offered to undertake the trimming of the Hill Top Hedge for £1 per chain, but the clerk was asked to obtain Mr D Clark's price before a decision was made.

LITTER ON WOOD HILL

Councillor Butler said he thought some of the deposited litter had been cleared away but the "No Litter" notice had not yet been placed as promised by the B.D.C.

ALLOTMENTS

A letter received from Jas. Martin & Co. suggests that the Council relinquish the tenancy of the allotment field as from the 6th April 1965 so that it can be let direct to Mr J Drury. The Clerk was instructed to inform Jas. Martin & Co. that the Council would agree providing that Mr Burgess of West Hill Farm, who is tenant of one third of the allotment field, and a good tenant, be allowed to retain his tenancy if he so wished.

BURTON HILLS

The above letter also asked what the Council considered would be a reasonable rent for the Hillside land and suggested a meeting to discuss the matter. The Council was instructed to inform Jas. Martin & Co. that the Council were not inclined to discuss any increase in rent in this comparatively new period of the lease.

BUS SHELTERS

It was agreed that as the erection of the proposed Darby Road shelter would be in abeyance for some time, a similar shelter be erected at Thealby, planning permission to be obtained, and in view of the possible percentage rise in price since the previous ones were built, the cost to be checked with the builder.

The Clerk was also instructed to obtain the views of Major E C R Sheffield on the suggestion that a shelter be erected at Normanby now that the Normanby Park was a Public Park, for it was felt that by doing so the Council would be giving a little assistance to the Scunthorpe Corporation in the Park project.

POSTAL SERVICES

The Council expressed concern at the Postal Service in the village, and the Clerk was asked to register complaint with the Scunthorpe Postmaster that there was no second delivery in certain areas, particularly on the north side of the Post Office, also to inform him that the Council considered that due to the continued growth of the village additional delivery service was necessary to overcome the late delivery now prevailing.

A fitting reminder to all of us as we enter the village, of the ultimate sacrifice some former residents made. We hope next year to work with the Heritage group and extend the poppies to Normanby. Thank you to R'evolution for the bikes which many of you will remember over summer and which by the time this newsletter comes out should be replanted and out and about again. In case you haven't noticed they all have a "life story" attached to them and they're worth a read. R'evolution is based at Normanby Hall and they recycle old bikes, offer qualifications in horticulture and want to support local communities. They're currently working with us and the school in the village. Finally, thank you to all the litter pickers out there who are doing a great job in the village and helping to keep it looking good.

It's possible that the fete will be on a different Saturday in June from usual as we are preparing to help the village celebrate the Queen's Platinum Jubilee.
