CHAIR AND VICE CHAIR REPORT

The rain is finally having small periods of rest, but the extensive period of heavy rainfall is still evidenced in the way the grass, trees and plants are growing so phenomenally quickly. No sooner has a cut been finished than you feel you could start all over again. The same is true for Anne our grounds maintenance operative – she feels very attached to her mower and strimmer!!! Unfortunately the equipment has no means of collecting the wet cut grass which means that the work she does all around our villages – as well as the work done by our verge cutters – does leave things looking a little messy. Over time the cut grass will mulch in – and if we have no more rain the situation will gradually improve.

On a different note, on the playing field at Burton there is now a permanent fixed table-tennis table, the purchase of which has been funded by a North Lincs Community Grant, and the Trim Trail has been replaced and now offers a trail that will be safe and attractive into the future. Soon to come will be the monkey challenges at both Burton and Thealby – hopefully by the school summer holidays.

Last time we wrote we were hoping for the Secretary of State's decision with regard to the proposed North Lincolnshire Green Energy Park. This was deferred from mid March to mid May, and now goes forward to mid July. They say 'no news is good news' – do we dare to hope?

The problems related to the reopening of the Wharf continue, with the excess of HGVs around. While many of these are wharf related, there are also some who have a genuine reason for being here and some local businesses that rely on their presence in order to serve us, but see the article about the wharf after this.

Look out for 'Lincs Lotto', enjoy 'Burton in Bloom', have fun at the '80's nite'. All these will raise money that will go back into the community and strengthen community spirit..

STOP THE WHARF!

Residents of Burton Upon Stather and surrounding villages continue to face significant challenges due to operations at Kings Ferry Wharf. However, the residents' campaign group, Stop the Wharf (STW), is gaining momentum and support in their efforts to halt these disruptive activities.

While environmental factors such as high noise and dust emissions are daily concerns for those living near the wharf, a pressing issue



affecting the entire village and surrounding areas is the massive increase in Heavy Goods Vehicles (HGVs) traveling through our area to serve the wharf.

Our villages are not equipped to handle the volume of HGVs required by the wharf. Recently, on 5th June, thousands of tonnes of cement were delivered by ship to the wharf, necessitating hundreds of lorries passing through our villages in the coming weeks.

This surge in HGV traffic significantly increases the risk of traffic incidents involving vulnerable road and path users. It also leads to higher levels of air pollution, elevated noise levels, and rapid deterioration of our village roads, resulting in potholes and kerbstone damage. This issue affects us all!

Key areas of HGV concern include the 'S' bends on Darby Road, the tight turn onto Stather Road, the restricted width at the High Flags (opposite the Church), and the steep hill on Stather Road – all of which are frequently used by school children. The presence of these large vehicles in such sensitive areas heightens the risk of accidents and poses a serious safety hazard.

Moreover, the continuous noise from HGVs disturbs the peace and tranquillity of our villages. The emissions from these vehicles

contribute significantly to air pollution, which can have detrimental health effects on residents, particularly vulnerable groups like children and the elderly. The vibrations caused by the heavy traffic also damage the infrastructure, leading to frequent repairs and disruptions.



However, there is hope. Recently, other villages in the North Lincolnshire area have successfully banned HGVs from their localities, and STW is campaigning for a similar outcome. The success of these nearby villages provides a blueprint for our own efforts. Additionally, STW continues to report all illegal operations at Kings Ferry Wharf to the relevant authorities, ensuring that regulatory bodies are aware of the ongoing issues.

STW is truly appreciative of the support from the majority of local residents and is proud to have the backing of Burton Upon Stather Parish Council.



Strong relationships with North Lincolnshire Council are also being formed, as collaborative efforts are essential in addressing this issue. Our local council has arranged a multiagency meeting to discuss the effects of the wharf operations, and STW representatives have

been invited to attend. This meeting represents a crucial opportunity to voice our concerns and work towards a solution. Updates will be provided on our private Facebook group and other media outlets when appropriate.

Our Facebook group is very active and serves as a central hub for information and community support. Search for 'Stop the Wharf' on Facebook and request to join our private chat group to stay informed and engaged. The group allows residents to share their experiences, offer suggestions, and coordinate efforts to address the issues caused by the wharf operations.

Soon, you will be able to show your support for STW by displaying a free house or car window sticker, which will be made available at key outlets around the village, including Burton in Bloom and the Ferry House (Bottom Pub). These stickers will help raise awareness and demonstrate the community's unified stance against the disruptive operations at Kings Ferry Wharf.

The support of our community is vital in this campaign. Together, we can make a significant impact and work towards restoring peace and safety in our villages. Join STW in this important fight to protect our environment and quality of life.

VILLAGE HALL NEWS

Since the last issue, the Village Hall has had its AGM and I am pleased to have been re-elected as Chair. Other key positions have been filled for this year, with the exception of Treasurer as Jan Benn has decided that she does not wish to continue in post but is happy to continue unofficially until a replacement is found. Jan is still in charge of bookings. At time of writing this, we do have someone interested in the Treasurer post and Jan would be willing to continue to lend her expertise once the post is filled.

More work has been carried out on the Village Hall. The doorway between the foyer and Wedgwood Room has been widened and a new door fitted. The whole of the exterior wall round the main entrance has been cleaned and repointed with a lime mortar mix. As well as being more pleasing to the eye, the wall can 'breathe', lessening chance of damp.

Because the building is large and aging, there will always be work to do. It is always our intention to provide a building that is easier and cheaper to maintain in the future.

As always, to make the Village Hall financially viable, we do need the support of groups and individuals so <u>please</u> consider us when looking for somewhere to use. Thanks to a grant being awarded from Grange Windfarm, the parish council has been able to replace the noticeboard on the outside of 15 High Street. This will now be used as a community noticeboard for groups and businesses to advertise and will replace that which was previously available at the shop. Notices will be displayed for a maximum of two weeks, but this will be determined by the space available.

GRANGE WINDFARM GRANTS

Fern Community Funds will no longer be offering grants to community groups from the Grange Windfarm funds. Instead from April 2024, they will be passing the funding onto the parish council for use in the community. There are strict guidelines that must be followed, but if any community group requires funding, then they are to apply to the parish council. This funding is in addition to the grants that the parish council can usually provide and if it is not used before March 2025, the excess funds will have to be paid back.
