VILLAGE HALL NEWS

Since the last issue of this publication, the Village Hall like all readers have been blessed with a shot of reality i.e. a gas bill. The rise in unit cost means the Hall has a shortfall in it's monthly finances. We cannot continue to reduce our reserves indefinitely; therefore we are reluctantly looking at increasing our rental charges. In the meantime can I make a plea yet again to all regular and casual users to:

PLEASE LEAVE THE HEATING SETTING AS THEY ARE. If you arrive for a booked session the heating will have been set to come on just before your arrival time. The Hall is a large space to heat and may not be up to the heat you require but please be patient, the boiler will not warm the Hall any faster if you turn the thermostat up and if left on full the next user will complain that when they arrive the hall is too hot and will open the doors and windows wasting expensive gas.

We are expecting three building contractors in this week to quote for a schedule of extensive remedial work making the Hall fit for a fair few more years of serving the village. After all It's part of the Burton

heritage: most of us have used it at one stage or another and it caters for us quite literally from the cradle to the grave!

Ultimately we hope this means we can move forward in the Spring with the works which will close the Hall for a short period of time, but vastly improve things into the future.

ON THIS DAY IN HISTORY

Welcome to our section where we look back in time to see what our Parish Council of yesteryear were doing. This issue brings us the minutes of a Parish Council Meeting held in December 1973

Minutes of the Meeting held in the County School on Monday 10th December 1973 – Mr C W Fish presiding

<u>Present</u> Councillors C W Fish, C F Applewhite, S Kitchinson, J Lawrence, C R Saunby, Mrs Waterson

<u>In attendance</u>: District Councillor Mrs Mitchell and Rural District Councillor C B Knight, also Mrs Applewhite, Mr Kettles, Mr Taylor, Mrs Taylor and Mrs Smith representing the Glebe Estate residents.

Apology: received from Councillor G W Robinson

Matters arising out of the minutes

New development to the north of the Glebe Estate – The question of the proposed access to the new development was again discussed with the representatives of the Glebe Estate residents, and after the discussion Cllr Lawrence proposed that the Council support the residents in their concern that the proposed access through the Estate

and Holme Drive, the roads of which are not suitable for through traffic and that due consideration must be given to the matter. Cllr Saunby second the proposal.

The Chairman asked for a recorded vote for he considered that under the circumstances that course was right and proper and in favour of the proposal there were four votes with no objections and no abstentions. The Clerk was asked to inform the County Planning Officer of the Council's support for the residents who have already lodged a formal objection with the Planning Authority, and in addition, to raise two quite separate matters in connection with the Planning Application, namely surface water and sewage. The Council consider that the present facilities for disposal are totally inadequate and they would welcome an opportunity to discuss all these matters.

<u>Plant a Tree Scheme</u> – Cllrs Lawrence and Saunby and the Clerk with Mrs Hopper representing the Women's Institute met the County Forrester on 6th December in connection with the scheme, but he was not particularly co-operative and seemed unwilling to offer any actual assistance. He did say that the three sites which had been suggested, the Fish Shop corner, the triangle at the entrance to Vicarage Crescent, and the corner of Glebe Close, were unsuitable because of the obstruction of vision, and suggested that the Council should commence planting trees in the Glebe Paddock Amenities area. This course has already been suggested by the Council. Mrs Hopper said she would convey the suggestion to the W.I.

<u>Council Notice Board</u> – a quotation of £245.00 + VAT has been received for the new type notice board. The Chairman said that this price was obviously prohibitive and the matter must be left on the table <u>Playing Field Fencing</u> – Jas Martin & Co were approached with regard to repairing the fencing and in reply say that since the Council have taken the liability for the fence they should repair it.

Other Business

<u>Sale of Parish Garden</u> – Permission to sell has been given by the Secretary of State. The Chairman said it should be sold by tender at the District Valuer's price but there were several things to be considered and decided before calling the District Valuer. There was the question of the drift road which is almost diagonally across the

plot, this would have to be re-sited for it is essential that the Council should retain Right of Way to the hills from the south end. The type of road and the question of its maintenance would have to be decided. Boundaries would have to be established and fencing considered.

The Chairman said that a survey in connection with the drift road would be carried out shortly.

<u>Estimates for 1974/1975</u> – The Chairman asked for nominations for a Sub-Committee to consider the 1974/1975 Estimates in readiness for the January Council Meeting. Cllrs Robinson, Mrs Waterson, and Applewhite with the Chairman, were appointed and a Committee Meeting arranged for 7th January 1974.

<u>Clerk's Salary</u> – The Clerk withdrew while the Council considered his salary, and after discussions Cllr Kitchinson proposed that the salary be increased to £135.00 per annum, that it be backdated to October 1973, and that it be reviewed annually. Cllr Lawrence seconded the proposal which was carried unanimously. The advice of the Lindsey Association of Parish Councils had been asked for in connection with the matter, and the figure decided upon is derived from a formula suggested by the National Association of Parish Councils.


